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Hellenic Women's Benevolent Association KICKS OFF CAPITAL CAMPAIGN

√he Hellenic Women's Benevolent Association (HWBA) has initiated a Capital Campaign to bring the Hellenic Nursing and Rehabilitation Center to the next level of nursing home care and rehabilitation. This will be The Hellenic's first capital fundraising effort in over 20 years and will seek to raise \$5 million of the total \$8.5 million cost of the project. The start of the Campaign comes when the HWBA's commitment to compassionate, quality care of the community's elderly population has never been stronger. Funds raised during the Campaign will address improvements in three broad areas: essential infrastructure needs, code compliance requirements and building improvements.

To raise the funds needed, the HWBA has begun conducting a series of events to get the Campaign underway, including the recently-held annual Radiothon. The HWBA has also budgeted \$1.5 million of donated gifts amassed as they prepared plans for the renovations. These funds, coupled with an anonymous gift of \$100,000 will go toward renovating the Home's living and dining room area just off the Home's lobby starting in Q1of 2020. In addition, a second anonymous donor has issued a challenge grant stipulating that if the HWBA raises \$1.8 million, the donor will make a \$750,000 gift.


"For more than 45 years, The Hellenic has served

those within our care well," said Pamela B. Houlares, HWBA Executive Board President. "Now we must build upon that tradition of quality by renovating and improving The Hellenic for the future."

Opened in 1973, the Hellenic Nursing and Rehabilitation Center has a history of reaching a number of major milestones and has retained its roots in the Greek community, while answering the needs of the broader region, serving people of all ethnic and religious origins.

"Our work has expanded to include many services that were not available in the original Hellenic Nursing Home for the Aged, but the spirit of a true home—a caring, friendly, loving and comforting place—is still our focus," remarked Pam.

A long tradition of philanthropy has made the Home a wonderful community resource. The HWBA's careful management suffices to maintain operations and fund modest capital expenses, yet for all significant renovations, new programs or expanded services, the HWBA must rely on the generosity of its donors and the community. Once the rennovations are complete, The Hellenic will more fully provide a more comfortable and welcoming environment for all who visit, live and work in the Home.

The HWBA Story: NEIGHBORS HELPING NEIGHBORS

Back in the mid-1950s, a small but determined group of Greek Orthodox women combined their energies to confront a serious problem in their community — the growing plight of elderly individuals in the region unable to care for themselves. Many older people in Eastern Massachusetts lacked the support they needed to face the challenges of advancing age. Many had serious health issues and were lonely, having lost their spouse. Many had no family close by and lacked financial resources. Many were simply no longer able to cope with their day-to-day medical, psychological and social needs.

Then in 1954, this pioneering group of women

took matters into their own hands, eventually organizing a non-profit known as the Hellenic Women's Benevolent Association (HWBA). During the 50s and 60s, they worked tirelessly to care for their families and neighbors while organizing many fundraisers and asking the community for support.

Their goal was to provide a safety net for our region's elderly and to leave no family member behind – and ultimately to build a home to care for the aged.

Today, the Home, under the direction of the HWBA, continues its focus on the quality of care and services provided to residents and patients.



Tithout the work of the intrepid women who founded it, and the thousands of donors whose gifts have funded and sustained it, The Hellenic would not exist today. A long tradition of philanthropy has made this wonderful community resource an ongoing reality. Without the Community's continuing generosity, The Hellenic is challenged to address the pressing needs that we face today.

Annual fundraising programs, such as the Radiothon, Easter Appeal and Luncheon Under the Tent, have provided funds for many improvements throughout the Home over the years. The pending Building on Tradition Capital Campaign requires a more ambitious approach.

Providing a safety net for our region's elderly and leaving no family member behind has been at the heart of the dedicated volunteers of the HWBA. We rely on the philanthropic support of the regional community and have stewarded many trusted and cherished relationships over the years. Our building renovation project is urgently needed.

We hope our many friends will help us build on our tradition and continue our legacy of care.
